Greetings to ALL of you Model A Lovers,

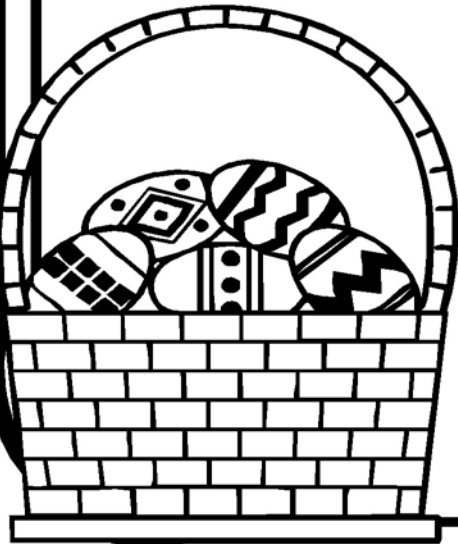

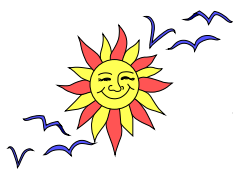

## Era Fashion News . . . From Teresa Gissible

Jeepers, creepers where did you get those peepers, or Betty Davis eyes, Betty Boop even Clair Bow all had that 'Look'. What look, false eyelashes. When did it all start? Actually, they are not a new thing. The first false lashes were dated back to Victorian Era. Then, they were transplanted and sewing them on! Ouch!

In 1903, Charles Nessler invented the first perming machine, selling boxed pairs of artificial strip eyelashes called "Nestolashes". Held with spirit gum which was messy and often glued your eyes together.

The 1920's Eyelashes were advertised for adventures girls that got their makeup ideas from the movies. Hollywood made them stylist and dramatic in Silent Movies. Your eyes had to speak for you. Men however thought they were scary and not for real ladies. A popular style in the 1920's were beaded lashes. The technique consisted of melting a type of cosmetic eyelash coating and applying beaded pieces to the ends. Vogue, ads featuring artful fake lashes, with some laden with gold or platinum beads showcased in New York City national convention of hairdressers 1930. By the mid 30's drama eyelashes where much tamer. Actresses no longer relied on dramatic eye in their acting talents.

The 1950's introduction plastic materials for making false eyelashes. Up till then they were made of human or animal hair, which is another (gross) story.

Today, it's still a very hot stylist item, thanks to Twiggy, Cher, Kardashian's plus the Drag Queens for an array of colors and styles available.

Now, personal experience, I have used false eyelashes. It's quite an art till you get the hang of it. Plus, the glue has come a long way from spirit gum. Now, you have choices of surgical glues in clear, white or black. Much easier to use and remove without gluing your eyes or fingers together. They are fun.

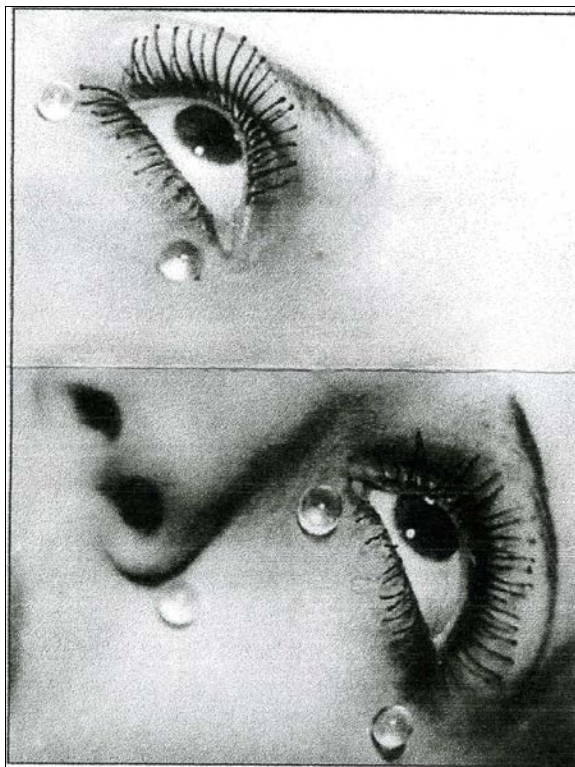




### -Have a Look at the New Eyelashes
