
Ladies Tour October 9

Era Fashion News From Teresa Gissible

Happy 4th of July to all of you! Our year is at the 1/2 way mark. Things are finally looking like we might be back to normal?

I came across an interesting article about eyeliner use in Model A Era. Thought I'd share it with you.

You might think that eyeliner was always part of a classic beauty routine, but until the 1920's, the average American women had never even heard of it.

It's true-every girt's must-have eye makeup product burst onto our country's beauty scene less then 100 years ago. In part, this had to do with women abandoning fashions of the Victorian era and embracing new influences from stage actors, dancers, film stars and photography. But eyeliner's popularity didn't really skyrocket until 1922, with the discovery of King Tutankhamen's tomb was opened. This event introduced the Western world to Egyptian eyeliner styles, which quickly caught on in the USA. American eyeliner styles have evolved in the most fascinating way. Here are vintage photographs of eyeliner styles through the decades.





The 1920's were a time of experimentation for women, and applied their eyeliner with a sense of drama. Heavy black eyeliner styles were huge at the time, and brands like Maybelline, Revlon, and Max Factor generated over \$1 billion a year on kohl shadows. Women also made their own DYI versions of the product with petroleum jelly and soot. Re-create this vintage style with Make Up For Ever's Kohl Pencil in Black 1K (\$18).

By the 1930's, edgy black makeup was replaced with softer finishes like shimmery shadows and feminine pinks. Mascara had become a makeup essential by this time, as did faint, pencil-thin eyebrows. Eyeliner was typically worn just on the upper lid, traced right against the lash line from the inner corner to the outer corner, ending in a slightly upturned flick.

TRANS ROLLER BEARINGS

Thanks to Tom Endy for this information, as it will save a lot of grief if you are building a transmission.


The Model A kingdom in the last few years has been inundated with extremely poor quality transmission roller bearings. There are two short bearings, part number A7118-A and one long bearing, part number A7121-A. Apparently the original manufacturer went out of business and an off-shore manufacturer is now making them under the same part number, but in a completely different design. The original bearing design had an axle at the

end of each roller element that fit into a hole in the two end plates. The newly designed roller elements have a recess drilled into each end that fits onto small round mushroom shaped protrusions stamped into the end plates. The recess rides on the protrusion and will wear through it for a very short service life and then the bearing will fail. Just about every Model A supplier is carrying these poor-quality bearings; and many are not even aware of the switch. Unless the bearings are examined closely it is difficult to tell which are the good quality and which are the poor quality.

The way to tell a good quality bearing is to put your pointer finger down inside the bearing and with your thumb rotate one of the elements. You should be able to easily see the axle end of the element rotating inside the hole in the end plate. The poor-quality bearings do not have holes in the end plates, even

bearing surface was rough (poor quality).

though they appear to be holes when viewed from the ends. However, they are not holes, they are merely the inside of the stamped recesses.


