Hey there Fellow Model Aer's.



### Ladies Tour October 9


We will be meeting at Home Decor and More at 502 McHenry Avenue, Modesto (corner of Morris Ave) at 9:30.

## Era Fashion News .... From Teresa Gissible

### Take a Little Trip

Traveling in a Model A is one of the highlights of our hobby. Combining an interest in Model As, travel, and era fashion is about the best thing I can think of to experience all aspects of this hobby. Where are you going? Is it for the weekend? What's the weather forecast? A few things to ask yourself before beginning to plan your wardrobe and luggage requirements.

according to the June 1931 issue of Good Housekeeping. This sentiment is very similar to the short tours so many of our chapters take each year. Do you and a few Model A friends like to take day trips and pack a lunch? Have a little fun with it! One of my favorite trips involved the Southeastern Touring group and a trip onto the Blue Ridge Parkway. My husband and I packed a lunch and brought our picnic set along. Add some fried chicken, potato salad, and lemonade for a trip you won't soon forget. (Figure 1) These luncheon kits were suggested for anyone "motoring much". This cobra-grained Fabrikoid kit was setup for six-place settings and to fit

the running board. (Figure 2) Kits like these were available during all years of

the Model A era. They range from simple sets to more elaborate. I have seen kits with eight-place settings, multiple thermoses, tin, or enamel boxes to carry a variety of items, cups, and various other accessories. They are not the easiest to find at antique stores, but I have seen several in my travels. It may look like a suitcase if it is setting on the floor closed. Look a little closer and you may find a treasure.

"Talon Hookless Fasteners," "slide fasteners" or "Zip-O-Grips" were all names for what we would call a zipper. These started showing up in luggage before the Model A era. Here is an ad from July 1927 in the York (PA) Daily Record. (Figure 3) The same ad, two months earlier, from Austin, TX did not mention the "new zippered cases" noted in the "For Long Trips" section.

Of other interest is the mention on short trips using "light luggage for feminine travelers". Not only were motoring trips becoming commonplace, the ads were focusing on females and the needs of traveling with multiple dresses, shoes, and hats.

In our effort to reproduce an authentic trip in our Model As, we may not be able to go into every aspect, but pick something you enjoy and try it! If you love hats, find a nice hat box and throw it in the back seat, trunk or rumble seat. If you're lucky enough to have a truck, you have plenty of room for luggage. Be sure, if you're using originals, to keep them protected from the elements. They aren't making any more "Wheary Wardrolettes of buffalo rawhide." (Figure 5)

"Brimmed hats having returned to fashion importance, a large hat box is required, as proved by the Mendel-Drucker model, covered in Scotch tweed duck." Also shown, is the Oshkosh duffle bag of orange and red striped cord duck which is great for shoes. In the lady's hand you see a Zip-O-Grip handbag made of bright-colored goat skin. At her feet is the Revelation suitcase of black cobragrained cowhide with locks and adjusts to 14 sizes. The Seward Aero-Pak suitcase, to the far left, included wardrobe conveniences.

Hanging over the Seward is a Snuggle Rug of English plaid woolen, which, on motor trips, is a "wise precaution". This rug is bag shaped and uses a Talon Hookless Fastener closing. (Figure 4)

The items in Figure 5 include the Oshkosh hat box, with cord duck to match the duffle bag mentioned earlier. Trunks were used for longer trips, usually rail or sea travel. Wardrobe trunks would clothes keep your

organized and less wrinkled. Dresses of lace, such as Chantilly, were invaluable for travel as they don't show wrinkles as easily as silk. Wool suits were also great for cool days and less prone to wrinkling. Bringing along wraps or "tiny jackets" which can be used with multiple outfits is also a smart idea. Those with light fabric such as chiffon or "transparent velvet, require almost no space at all."

Lock fastener. (Figure 6)

Next time you travel in your Model A, think about your luggage and packing for the era. Many of these suitcases, duffles, and trunks can be found on eBay or in antique stores, for a decent price. Even if you only use it as a prop in your "A," or for your next trip down the runway at a fashion judging event, you'll be adding a little more authenticity to the occasion.

# THE CUT-OUT

From the files of Tom Endy


The Model A Ford generator cut-out is the mysterious little device that sits on top of the generator. There is a switch inside that is either open or closed. It's very simple purpose is to connect and disconnect the generator from the battery and the rest of the electrical circuit. In the days before there were generator regulator circuits the cut-out was a means to connect the generator to the car's electrical circuit when the engine was running, and disconnect it when the engine was not running.

When the generator is not rotating and producing electrical power its stopped condition would be a


drain on the battery. Therefore the cutout switch is commanded to open.

When the generator is rotating and producing electrical power the desire is to have the generator connected to the car's battery and electrical system. It then carries the load of any electrical device that is switched on and it also charges the battery. Therefore the cutout switch is commanded closed.

How it does this is where the mystery comes in. Anytime you pass current through a coil of wires it creates magnetism and magnetism is what opens and closes the switch. Inside the cutout housing, in addition to the switch, are two coils of wire. The two coils open and close the switch much like a relay operates.



The switch contacts inside the cut-out are normally open. The first coil has a very fine gauge wire and is connected in parallel with the generator. As soon as the generator starts rotating it begins to produce voltage and current flows through the coil. The

faster the generator rotates the higher the voltage level rises. When it reaches a set point above the battery voltage (a nominal 7 volts) the magnetism in the coil is strong enough to close the switch. The generator is then connected to the car's battery and electrical system.

The second coil has a very heavy gauge wire and is connected in series with the generator. The coil wire has to be heavy because all the current produced by the generator flows through this series coil. It too produces magnetism that is in concert with the first coil. The combined magnetism of the two coils keeps the switch closed.

When the engine speed returns to idle or is turned off and the generator slows or stops it is no longer producing voltage. The battery then takes over the load and <u>current</u> through the series coil is reversed. The <u>magnetism</u> of this coil is also reversed and is stronger than the parallel coil and it cancels it out and opens the switch.
